Where to go Camping Reelfoot Lake State Park



Reelfoot Lake State Park is located in the northwest corner of Tennessee and is noted for its fishing, boating and wildlife viewing. The 15,000 acre lake was created by a series of violent earthquakes in 1811-1812 that caused the Mississippi River to flow backwards for a short period of time, creating Reelfoot Lake. The park's ecosystem is unlike any other place in Tennessee. Reelfoot lake is a flooded forest. While Majestic Cypress trees rise above the water, below the surface are many submerged Cypress stumps. A variety of aquatic plants and flowers occupy the shoreline and saturate the shallow water. The lake harbors almost every kind of shore and wading bird as well as golden and American bald eagles.

During January and February, Reelfoot Lake is home to thousands of American bald eagles. Experienced park naturalists lead daily bald eagle and waterfowl tours. The annual Reelfoot Eagle Festival in February is a bird watching destination. In March and April, deep swamp canoe trips are offered and scenic pontoon boat tours are offered May - September. Every fall, hundreds of white pelicans stop at the lake on their seasonal migration. While the shallow lake offers many opportunities for boating and fishing, swimming in the lake is not permitted. The park has several hiking trails that are popular for bird watching and wildlife viewing. There are two campgrounds at Reelfoot Lake State Park. Campsites provide water, electricity, tables and grills with many campsites located on the lake shore.



What to Do – Birding, Camping, Fishing, Boating or other activities

Reelfoot Lake has 2 campgrounds that offer electric, water, picnic tables, & grills; all are level. Both campgrounds have a small number of primitive sites with water & some with picnic tables only.



While Reelfoot Lake is known for its eagles and Eagle Festival, White Pelicans also make the park home during their annual fall migration. A variety of other birds can be seen from the visitor center, including Prothonotary Warblers, Double-crested Cormorants, Wood Ducks and various wading birds.

It is ideal for canoes, kayaks, and jon boats; crappie & bluegill fishing; and has several hiking trails.

What to Eat Dutch Oven Cherry Dump Cake

Ingredients:

Can of Cherry pie filling
Yellow Cake Mix
Can of Lemon-lime soda
Chopped pecans



Instructions

Prepare the charcoal for the Dutch oven.
Line your Dutch oven with a liner or foil and spray with some cooking spray.
Dump the entire can of cherry pie filling into the bottom of the lined Dutch oven.
Mix the cake mix and soda in a separate bowl.
Pour the cake batter over the cherry pie filling.
Sprinkle the pecans on top (this is optional, especially if there are scouts with nut allergies)
Place the lid on the Dutch oven.
Create a circle of coals and place the pot on top.
Place coals on the lid.
Bake for 20-25 minutes or until it smells ready.

Three Leadership Styles (part 1) October 28, 2015 By Clarke Green

Although the founder of Scouting Baden-Powell and the Chinese philosopher Lao Tzu lived centuries apart on opposite sides of the world, each describe the same three distinct leadership styles.



More often than not we'll find some aspects all three styles in the same person. I know I have used all three styles at one time or another myself.

Leadership is the keynote to success- but leadership is difficult to define, and leaders are difficult to find. I have frequently stated that "any ass can be a commander, and a trained man may often make an instructor; but a leader is more like the poet- born, not manufactured."

*The best leader is one that the people are barely aware of
The next best is one who is loved and praised by the people.
Next comes one who is feared.
Worst is one who is despised.
If the leader does not have enough faith in his people,
They will not have faith in him.
The best leader puts great value in words and says little
So that when his work is finished
The people all say, "We did it ourselves!"*

Authoritarian Leaders

These are Lao Tzu's feared leader and Baden-Powell's commander. As a young, newly minted director of a program department at our camp, I was an insufferable authoritarian leader (I see myself at that time when I read Baden-Powell's "any ass can make a commander").

I was certainly demanding, not particularly friendly, and mistook my abrasiveness for clarity of mission. In fact, I was so brash, loud, and dictatorial I wonder any of my counselors lasted through the summer. I got my comeuppance at the end of the season when one of them had the sand to write exactly what he thought in his evaluation of my job. I owe him a great debt of gratitude; it changed me for the better.

Authoritarian leaders do get things done, but a Scouter's goal is much broader than efficiently completing tasks. Scouting has well-defined expectations, but these are not enforced in an obedience-oriented, authoritarian manner. We want our Scouts to be obedient, but we do not want them to be frightened. We encourage them to ask questions and respond by helping them find answers.

The Patrol Method

Patrols are the building blocks of a Boy Scout troop. A patrol is a small group of boys who are similar in age, development, and interests.

Working together as a team, patrol members share the responsibility for the patrol's success. They gain confidence by serving in positions of patrol leadership.

Scouting is not about controlling the conduct of young people. We have a much bigger challenge; to form their character as defined in the Scout oath and law.

The People With the Shirts

Imagine you are a newcomer at a meeting or activity in your own den or pack.

Are the people with the shirts (the adult leaders) striding over to you offering their hand in a few seconds? Or are they off in a corner, heads together, kind of like the cool kids at school?

Has someone taken the time to explain the obvious unspoken things you know nothing about? Or are the slickly moving through the activity, glancing at you to see if you are impressed?

How long did it take for someone to learn your son's name, what grade he's in, and what he most looks forward to doing as a Cub?

If you ask a question do you get a helpful, understanding response or are you treated like an ant at a picnic?

You aren't buying a used car from the people the shirts, but would you?

If not, why would you want them working with your child?

Are we welcoming, helpful, easy-going folks or kind of stand-offish? New people have been a challenge for me, on stage in front of the crowd I am confident, with new people; not so much.

Are we going out of our way to help people understand what we are doing, or speaking "Cub Code"? (What in the world is a Webelos anyway?)

Break the ice, shake hands, show some interest! I still have to tell myself this over and over again, someday I'll get it.

Our vision for unit service is to enable units to better serve more youth by providing an adequate number of trained commissioners who provide a link to district committees in support of a quality unit program. Fulfilling that vision demands that we continually recruit and train new members of our corps, and assigning dedicated commissioners to new units and units at risk increases the number of unit commissioners needed. As a practical matter, there may be times when a district simply doesn't have enough commissioners to assign to every unit. At those times, we'll do our best at increasing unit retention by assigning dedicated commissioners to new units and units at risk first while continuing to recruit so that we'll have new members of the corps who can serve stronger units.
